


Serviceman of the Month: CPT John E. Mellen (Oct 17, 1917 -Feb 22, 2007) commanding officer of the 818th Amphibious Truck Company. This all-Black company trained at CGJ from Sep 1943 to Mar 1944, and was deployed as part of the 1st Engineers Special Brigade that landed on Utah Beach with the 4th Infantry Division on June 6, 1944. Mellen's daughters are enthusiastic supporters of the museum,

and it is their donation of his papers that helped us learn so much about the men of this company.

Artifact of the Month: These top-secret panoramic photos taken by submarine of the Normandy coast in the Winter/Spring 1944 helped invasion planners identify the features of Omaha Beach.

These were donated by the family of Captain Aden Unger, USCG, who commanded an LCI group on D-Day.
